hat a wet September we had!!

Edgar Mobbs tells me that in Newnham the total rainfall for the month was 8.4 ins (or 213.4mm), whereas the previous highest month in the time he has been recording was in April 2012 when they had 6.71 ins.. That makes September 2024 the wettest month in over a third of a century. For interest, the driest month in Edgar's records was June 2018 when only 0.9in (2.286mm) fell.

In Charwelton by comparison, where the records go back only to 1993, this September's figure was 191.5 mm, of which almost all fell between 22nd. and 27th., but the wettest month was October 2020 with 195.5mm.

Charwelton's driest months were in June 2006 and March 2011 which tied with 2.5mm

PASTORAL LETTER

Korean link in good heart

Dear Friends

Last month I was privileged to visit our link Church in Korea for the consecration of a new Bishop of Seoul, Bishop Elijah. His predecessor, Bishop Peter, had attended Bishop Debbie's welcome service in Peterborough earlier this year.

Our link relationship is in good heart. Since all the Korean bishops and their wives visited Northampton and Kettering a few years ago, we have welcomed students to camp at the Greenbelt Festival, provided a six-week placement for an ordinand and established three parish to parish partnerships. One of our clergy took a sabbatical at the Anglican university in Seoul.

I was made very welcome, joined worship in the now completed new Cathedral in Daejeon (it was a hard hat building site on my last visit!), and visited all three dioceses, including the port/resort city of Busan.

The consecration service which is

available to view online was graced



by four Archbishops, but our hosts kept talking about their connection with Peterborough and it was moving to realise how precious our

relationship is to them.

In his inaugural address Bishop Elijah spoke humbly of the Bishop's calling to be a servant, helping the whole Church to flourish. He concluded; "When the Church is faithful to its identity, God will use it, no matter the challenges of the time. Let us strive to be a Church that reflects the Kingdom of God, serving with love and dedication."

As a look forward, the annual horticultural society village wine tasting event is planned for December. The date we are hoping for is Friday 13 December.



Pots & Plans: what to do in your garden this November

Stop the rock

Large rose bushes can wibble wobble during autumn winds.

This 'wind-rock' can snap important branches and roots. This damage upsets plants and slows growth in spring or causes infection. So it's worth shortening any longer and heavier shoots now to reduce risk of damage. You can then return in winter to finish off pruning once your plants are fully dormant.

Come spring, I like to check my roses still feel secure in the ground, firming down the soil gently with my foot if loose.

Snap, snap

November is perfect to photograph your garden before making changes in 2025. You'll capture the boisterous growth of this year before any clearance, as well as more garden structure as leaves fall.

November is also perfect for writing notes about what you most enjoyed this year in your outdoor living space. And of course, the garden areas and views that didn't make you smile:)

Protect vulnerable plants from frost

For hardier varieties of tender plants, such as fuchsia and salvia, they're best unpruned until you see new growth in spring. The old growth gallantly guards the new growth buds from the worst winter cold. So wait until your plants are looking lively in spring before removing dead growth and clipping back to your preferred size and shape.

For borderline hardy plants that are too big to move indoors, these are best wrapped up in a cosy blanket. This is useful for bananas, olives, passion flower, tree ferns, and bottlebrush.

Horticultural fleece is a good blanket when secured with string or netting. As is hessian and straw. If plants are larger or sprawling, focus on their base or main buds and branches. I like to loosen covers in winter if we get a few days of milder weather. This gives a burst of ventilation before rewrapping.

For non-hardy bedding plants such as petunia, these are usually replaced each year. But for plants growing tubers underground, such as dahlia and cannas, store tubers frost free overwinter. First dig up your tubers, dry off, and store in dry compost or vermiculite until replanting indoors in spring in damp compost.

Right, I'm off to order hedging plants for winter planting.

At around the same time, there was recognition that the village would benefit from a Village Website, the purpose of which would be to: - $\,$


- act as a one stop shop for the village for all recreational activities, groups and clubs and to create an information access point.

- promote a sense of cohesion and pride across the wide variety of community groups and activities that the village has to offer.


